

City Officials Training Center Award Program



The City Officials Training Center is a voluntary continuing education program administered by KLC. City officials can complete education levels by attending KLC events and by submitting outside

training credit from other municipal training. There is no charge to enroll. If you attend a KLC training, your credit is tracked automatically.

Certificate levels in the City Officials Training Center (COTC) are now easier to achieve! Each level still requires 30 hours of training, but the category requirements have been removed with the exception of the one hour of ethics training. The three levels of training include:

- Level I Achievement in City Governance: 29 Hours of Approved Courses, 1 Hour of Ethics
- Level II Excellence in City Governance: 29 Hours of Approved Courses, 1 Hour of Ethics
- ◆ Level III Master of City Governance: 29 Hours of Approved Courses, 1 Hour of Fthics
- Masters Maintenance: 14 Hours of Approved Courses Completed Annually, 1 Hour of Ethics

Every workshop, roundtable discussion, networking workshop, cracker barrel and general session during the KLC Conference & Expo is available for COTC credit on an hour-by-hour basis. For example, if you attend a one-hour workshop, you will receive one (1) credit. Please make sure you are scanned before each event or you will not receive credit. Credits are valid for three years. Cities and The Public Service Commission: Unwrapping the Puzzle of the PSC's Role in Setting Municipal Utility Rates

The Public Service Commission significantly impacts many Kentucky cities and their citizens. It regulates the wholesale rates of almost 100 cities that provide wholesale water or wastewater service to water districts or water associations. It also regulates the rates and service of public utilities that provide electricity, natural gas or water service to the citizens of many cities. Few cities, however, are familiar with the PSC or its procedures. This workshop examines PSC's authority over municipal utilities, the regulatory requirements that the PSC imposes on municipal utilities, and the process that the PSC uses to set utility rates. It will briefly review the history of PSC regulation of municipal utilities. It will also review the problems that cities frequently experience when dealing with the PSC and offer possible solutions for avoiding or overcoming those problems as well as strategies for reducing litigation time and expense. Finally, the procedural and substantive issues related to a city's intervention in public utility rate cases on behalf of itself and its citizens will be reviewed


